THE RABBI TEACHES

The Circle Game

*And the seasons they go round and round
And the painted ponies go up and down
We're captive on the carousel of time
We can't return we can only look
Behind from where we came
And go round and round and round
In the circle game*

Every spring, this song (“The Circle Game” by Joni Mitchell) is sung as our 10th Grade Confirmation students walk into the sanctuary, up the center aisle, and onto the bimah. While I beam with pride as I watch our teens take their places and prepare to lead our Shavuot morning service, my eyes are always drawn to their parents’ faces as this opening song continues. For behind the smiles and the happy tears, I can see the slideshow playing in the minds of these parents—moments gone by, different stages of life, somehow leading them to this particular moment, and the feeling of being captive on the carousel of time while also wishing it could slow down just a little.

One of the things I love most about Judaism is that there is a prayer for everything. In every moment there is the potential for holiness—for raising what could be just a mundane act to the level of the sacred. We have prayers and blessings we recite when we wake up in the morning, at life cycle events, when we smell a flower, when we sit down to eat a meal, even when we use the bathroom.

Lately I’ve been wrestling with a question that came up in a conversation I was having with a group of friends as we stood around watching our soon-to-be Kol Ami ECC graduates playing together on the playground. We were talking about how fast time has gone and how our kids have truly grown up together here. Kol Ami gave our children their first teachers, their first friends, and it has given each of us a sense of community—as we have grown together, too. We couldn’t help but feel the weight of how these final months of the school year would be filled with “lasts”—the last ECC “Prom,” the last Shabbat morning program, the last day of Pre-K, the last morning drop-off. One of the parents asked me what prayer we recite for “endings,” what blessings we say when we do something for the very last time.

We know *shehecheyanu*—the well-known prayer of beginnings, of

first-time celebrations and experiences. What do we say to mark the end, to bless the sacredness inherent in doing something for the final time?

So often in life we don't know when we are doing something for the last time. We don't always know when we will talk to someone for the last time, share a final hug or a meal, or take one last picture together. We don't always know when we will pick up and carry our child for the last time, dance to our favorite song or visit our favorite place for the last time.

There are also endings that loom large, that we see coming—endings that we wish we could put off for a little while longer, even if they are also moments to celebrate—when a teenager leaves for college, when we move out of the house where we raised our family, or, in the case of that group of parents I happened to be talking with last month, when we prepare for our newly-turned-five-year-olds to graduate from preschool.

The irony is that every blessing for “last times” within Judaism reminds us how each ending contains the seeds and promise of new beginnings.

On Saturday nights, as we say goodbye to Shabbat with our ceremony of *Havdalah*, the blessings we recite are meant to encourage us to take some of the beauty and holiness of Shabbat with us into the new week just starting.

When we conclude a book of Torah, we recite the words *Chazak! Chazak! V'nitchazek!*—Strength! Strength! May we be strengthened! Yes, we may have finished the book, but we are encouraged to feel empowered to go on, to turn the page and continue. Every Simchat Torah, as we read the final verses of Deuteronomy, rolling the Torah scroll to its end, in the very next moment, we open another scroll to the opening words of Genesis and begin reading all over again.

Typically, in modern culture, we pride ourselves on finishing something. We step back and admire what we have done, what we have accomplished. We pat ourselves on the back, and then move on. In Judaism, when we finish a unit of study, the series of prayers we recite are referred to as *Hadran Alach*, which means, “we will return to you.” The prayer goes on to say how deeply we will remember what we have learned and how what we have learned will also, somehow, remember us. Our experiences, our learning, the people in our lives, leave an imprint on us, and we, in turn, leave our imprint on the places, people, and teachings we encounter. They become part of us, and we become part of them—and there is more to learn.

We may not be able to “return” in the literal sense to moments that have gone by. As the seasons of our lives push us forward, we recognize, acknowledge, and bless the fact that each season of our lives has led us to this moment in time, and this moment, too, will propel us forward like the ponies on the carousel. Judaism reminds us that endings are what allow for new beginnings to occur.

As another synagogue year comes to a close (Kol Ami's 4th year!), as memories shared are filed away, as we celebrate our graduates (Hebrew High School and Preschool), and as our Confirmands walk into the sanctuary as “The Circle Game” is sung in the background, may we each be blessed in our endings and new beginnings.

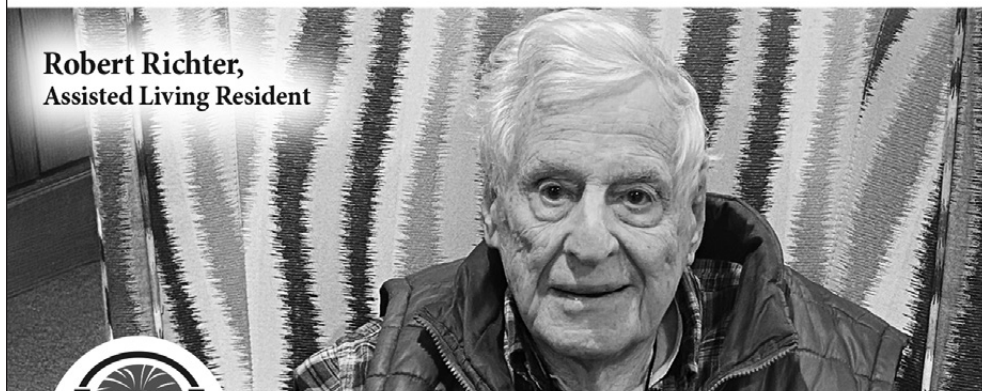

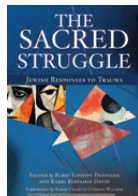

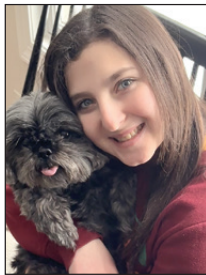
